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WEEKLY ROUND UP....

This week in Reception, children have been reading the story book 'Aliens Love Underpants' and completing lots of work based around where they might find aliens.

Some children looked at the different planets and put them in order and some even tried to name the different planets. One group decided to make a porthole from a space ship by cutting a circle out from a paper plate and covering the edges in foil before colouring in the inside circle and adding little aliens.

Another group made their own 2D spaceships using a variety of different shapes. The majority of children could confidently name all the shapes and explain what shape they needed next.

Another activity that challenged Reception children was to match the sentences to the different pictures. It was amazing how many pupils could read the sentences all by themselves. They all thoroughly enjoyed all these activities!











Reception children really look forward to their Tuesday afternoon dance lesson where they learn to follow a dance routine and how to create several dance moves.

The pupils enjoy listening to a piece of music and practising different ways of moving to the music.

There is always lots of laughter heard throughout their dance lessons and the children thoroughly enjoy 'showing their moves' to their friends.







WEEKLY ROUND UP....



Year 4 pupils have enjoyed taking part in various STEM activities.


They all worked hard to design and make the best glider to enter the whole school glider competition. They then went on to develop their gilders and made another set of gliders using different materials. They considered how the factors: lift, thrust, gravity and drag would impact their design, they also looked at different wing shapes. They used their knowledge from making the previous gliders to help them create their new designs. They had a lot of fun testing their gliders to see which ones flew successfully and the furthest.



Prep School - year 4



English lessons in Year 4 have been linked to our topic on the Stone Age. Pupils have enjoyed reading the text 'Stig of the Dump'. In one of the lessons children worked with partners to write a script for a news report about an escaped leopard, they then presented their news reports to the class.



Another part of our history topic on the Stone age which the children enjoyed was the experience of being archaeologists and investigating Stone age poo to find out more about the Stone age diet. They wore protective gloves and tweezers to find out what was inside the pooh then they needed to identify what type of food it was. They got stuck into the messy task and discovered 'fish bones', 'leaves', 'berries' and 'seeds'.

In maths children have been learning about perimeter. They created their own rectilinear shapes and then challenged their partner to work out the perimeter. They created some complicated shapes!



UPDATE ON AFTER SCHOOL CLUBS

The Prep School After School Club programme has changed for this half term, with handball now being offered on Mondays (Year 3 & 4) and on Thursday (Year 5 & 6).

Pupils in Year 2-6 have been working with our gymnastics coach in extracurricular gymnastics club. The children are having a great time exploring the different equipment and learning the different key movements. They are making amazing progress and we look forward to seeing them develop throughout the rest of the term.

All Prep School After School clubs are currently full and parents can sign their child up to the Summer Term over the holiday. Next term we will be offering cricket.

In Year 7, pupils are currently undertaking a project on the Jewish festival of Passover. They are eagerly creating a 'Passover guide' to help gentiles - non jews, learn all about this important festival.

Year 8 have just concluded a unit of work on a non-religious world view - Humanism. Pupils were visited by local Humanist Bill Green. Pupils had the opportunity to 'pick his brains' about the reasons why he does not believe in God.



In Year 9, pupils are currently half way through a unit on Sikhi. On Thursday pupils enjoyed Miss Hamilton's version of langar and devoured lots of yummy vegan treats whilst discussing how the main teachings of Guru Nanak are reflected in this Sikh tradition.

We place a huge emphasis on strengthening the knowledge, skills, and connections to keep children and young people healthy and safe and prepare them for life and work during weekly personal, social, health and economic (PSHE) lessons.
