To extend our Nursery topic, 'People Who Help Us', the children have also been acting out a Library role play scenario in our very own Hydesville Library, fully equipped with librarians. Green Group used the available resources to use their knowledge of how a library operates combined with their imagination to recreate a fun way of choosing and sharing books in a word rich environment.

We value the importance of imaginative play in the early years as this allows the children to learn critical thinking skills, how to follow simple directions, build expressive and receptive language, increase social skills and learn how manage their feelings.

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




































































## Schier School

Senior pupils have been working hard in History this term. Year 7 have produced some most impressive pieces of work including their amazing Motte and Bailey Castle models and antiqued letters as victims of the Black Death. Well done to all year 7 pupils for your fantastic efforts.

Additionally, all members of the Senior School community have been involved in commemorating Holocaust Memorial Day during the month of January. They learnt about the horrors of genocide in assembly, created a window display for HMD, were encouraged to individually commemorate the victims of the Holocaust by participating in the national #Lightthedarkness event and submitting entries into the Holocaust Memorial Day Competition. In lessons pupils in Year 9 have undertaken an in-depth study into the events that lead to the Holocaust and considered the experiences of those involved.

This has proven to be a very thought provoking and emotive topic and pupils have demonstrated maturity and empathy throughout. Year 9 pupils also participated in a national webcast event with Holocaust survivor Hedi Argent and Natasha Kaplinski, in which they heard Hedi's harrowing testimony of her experience during the Nazi occupation of Austria and her subsequent escape to Britain. Although this was a challenging subject, pupils were able to ask appropriate and searching questions and found the experience worthwhile and thought provoking.



## Safer Internet Day



Safer Internet Day took place on Tuesday, 6 February. Our Internet Safety, Antibullying and Wellbeing Ambassadors helped to raise awareness of a safer and better internet in an assembly last week. As Safer Internet Day coincided with Children's Mental health week, the ambassadors focused on the changes we can make to support our digital wellbeing. Pupils learnt about the new Online Safety Bill which has been introduced to help keep illegal content away from young minds, the "take a break" feature on Instagram which addresses screentime, how to filter comments on TikTok and hiding dislikes on Youtube.

This week, we have been exploring this year's theme "Inspiring Change," in PSHE lessons. Key Stage 3 pupils described how technology and the internet have changed over time and identified the positive and negative impact of tech. Key Stage 4 pupils explored how online content and influencers change the way young people think, feel and act online. Both Key Stages discussed how they would respond to certain online safety concerns and made pledges to make changes online to support mental health.

Cognita Schools employ multiple technologies to help keep our children safe online. School devices are installed with Lightspeed and Smoothwall.

## Lightspeed:

• Web filtering: Blocks inappropriate content based on categories

• Student activity monitoring: Tracks online activity to identify potential risks

• Reporting: Provides insights into students' online behaviours

## Smoothwall:

Network security: Safeguards the school network from cyberattacks and malware

Content filtering: Works in conjunction with Lightspeed to block mature content



## Online safety tips for parents of pre-school children 0-5 Year Olds

## Checklist:

#### Put yourself in control

Make use parental controls available on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. You can find out how at your broadband provider's website or <u>by visiting</u> internetmatters.org.

#### Search safely

Use safe search engines such as swiggle.org.uk or kids-search.com. **Safe search settings can also be activated on Google and other search engines** as well as YouTube and it is possible to lock these so that they can't be inadvertently removed. You can find out more by <u>visiting the Google Safety Centre</u>. Once you've put all of these controls in place have a browse and search for a few things to see what your children might see, if they were to do the same. Remember that voice-activated search works really well now.

#### Set boundaries

It's never too early to start setting rules about when and for how long your child can use devices and start to introduce the subject of internet safety at the same time. Encourage children to use devices in a shared spaces like a lounge or kitchen. Make sure to keep other devices out of reach and use passwords so they can't go online without asking you first. It's also a good idea to have tech-free mealtimes and not to allow children to have devices in their bedrooms at this age.

#### Explore together

Set your homepage to a child-friendly site such as CBeebies and give them a user account which only allows access to sites and apps you've chosen.

#### Help them learn through games

Games are a great way for young children to explore the internet and learn about the world around them. **Choose a variety of safe and educational online games and apps to play with your child** so that you'll feel more comfortable with them exploring. Make use of websites and platforms designed specifically for pre-schoolers like CBeebies, YouTube Kids, Nick Jr, and use <u>age ratings</u> and reviews in the app store to check app suitability.

Online safety tips for parents of primary school children 6-10 Year Olds

## Checklist:

#### Agree on boundaries

Be clear about what your child can and can't do online – where and when they can use the internet, how much time they can spend online, the sites they can visit and the type of information they can share. Agree with your child when they can have a mobile phone or tablet.

When you do give them their first device make sure that it is set up appropriately for them with the right parental controls in place. It's a good idea to **introduce tech-free meal times** and encourage them to **keep phones out of the bedroom at night** to help them build a healthy screen time balance.

#### Put yourself in control

Set parental controls on your home broadband and any internet-enabled devices. Set up a user account for your child on the main device they use and make sure other accounts in the household are password-protected so that younger children can't access them by accident.

#### Explore together

The best way to support your child online is to **talk to them about** what they do online and what sites and apps they like to use. Be inquisitive and ask them to show you their favourites to check they're suitable.

#### Search safely

If you let your child search independently, make sure safe search is activated on Google and other search engines, as well as restricted mode on YouTube. You can set your default search to one designed specifically for children, such as Swiggle, and can save time by adding these to your Favourites.

#### Check if it's suitable

The age ratings that come with games, apps, films and social networks are a good guide to whether they're suitable for your child. For example, the minimum age limit is 13 for several social networking sites, including Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat and TikTok.

Make use of platforms and services designed with children in mind like CBBC, YouTube Kids, Sky Kids, BBC iPlayerKids. Although sites aimed at under-10s like Spotlite (Formerly Kudos) also have social networking elements. #### Stay involved


Encourage them to use their tech devices in a shared space like the lounge or kitchen so you can keep an eye on how they're using the internet and also share in their enjoyment.

#### Talk to siblings


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It's a good idea to talk to any older children about what they're doing online and what they show to younger children. Encourage them to be responsible and help keep their younger siblings safe.

## Learn about it:

#### Teach your child some simple rules

- Make sure your child knows not to share personal information like their phone number or email address online.
- Encourage them to only talk to real-life friends or family if they are on sites with a social media or chat element like Roblox.
- Use privacy settings wherever they exist to keep their information private - help your child to set these up. Remember that the default on many sites is public.
- Be a good online friend and don't say nasty things even if it's just a joke.
- Direct them to use secure and legal sites to download music and games to avoid experiencing the risks associated with streaming content from unauthorised sites. Visit our "Dangers of digital piracy' advice hub more advice.
- Advise them to Check attachments and pop-ups for viruses before they click or download anything and ask if they aren't sure.
   You can set up their phone/tablet so you need to grant permission before they are able to download an app or game.
- Encourage them to use Public Friendly WiFi when they're out and about to filter inappropriate content but also use the parental control tools on the device just in case they do connect to an unfiltered WiFi - the most likely place for this to happen could be at a friend's house.
- Help them to better understand the different online platforms they use and judge the quality and reliability of online resources. Take a look at our <u>fake news and misinformation advice hub</u> to help children spot, and stop the spread of fake news online.

## Talk about it:

#### Tips for a meaningful conversation

- Start conversations when your children won't be embarrassed, for example in the car going home from school. Try to de-personalise it by asking their opinion on a current news story that relates to an online issue.
- Be proactive don't wait until something has already gone wrong - discuss issues ahead of time - knowing what children of a similar age are doing will help you know more about the environment that your child is living in.
- Ask them for advice on how to do something online and use this as a conversation starter.

- Make sure they know they can come to you
  if they're upset by something they've seen
  online listen to them when they do and
  try not to overreact the important thing
  is that they have come and told you!
- Be sensitive and praise them when they share their online experiences with you.
- If your child comes to you with an issue, stay calm and listen without judging them.
- Talk about online grooming as you would stranger danger and explain that people they meet online might not be who they say they are.
- Ask them about things online which might make them (or others) uncomfortable.
